## THE CLASSICAL AND CHRISTIAN MODEL

Geneva School of Boerne is a classical and Christian private school serving students in K-Prep through twelfth grade. A classical education comprises three stages-grammar, logic and rhetoric-known compositely as the trivium. Each of these stages is explained more fully in the subsequent pages of this guide. More importantly, however, a Geneva education is a Christian education. We teach from a biblical worldview orientation, meaning we assume that the biblical understanding of truth, the world, mankind and our place in the world is accurate; and thus, we teach every subject from this standpoint and evaluate every idea by these biblical assumptions.
Although Geneva is a KP-12 school, describing our structure as a 12 -KP school more clearly reflects our intentions. We start with the end product of a Portrait of a Graduate (found at right) and work back through the stages of rhetoric, logic and grammar respectively. This model allows the end result to drive the process as we stay focused and committed to our mission.

## OVERVIEW

The Rhetoric School, serving students in ninth through twelfth grade, is the arena in which the knowledge and virtues acquired in Grammar School and Logic School are given their full measure of expression. Our accredited and award-winning academics, athletics and arts programs uphold the classical ideal by teaching


Matt Donnowitz Rhetoric Headmaster students to recognize and pursue truth, goodness and beauty in every endeavor. In this stage of their education, each student is equipped to develop a biblical worldview and disciplined life as a disciple of Jesus Christ.
Geneva's curriculum is built on a classical, liberal arts model designed to cultivate virtuous students who can speak and write with eloquence in any discipline. The Humanities Program, composed of history and literature courses in which Socratic Seminars and Harkness Discussions take place, forms the cornerstone of a Rhetoric student's education.
Students are also provided a full range of AP courses including AP Biology, AP Chemistry, AP Physics 1, AP Calculus AB, AP Statistics, AP Computer Science Principles, AP Music Theory, AP Art History, AP Music Theory, AP Spanish Language and Culture, AP Latin and AP United States Government and Politics.

Geneva participates in the Texas Association of Private and Parochial Schools (TAPPS) in the arenas of academics, athletics and fine arts.

## LIFE IN RHETORIC SCHOOL

At Geneva, students develop themselves inside the classroom through enriching academics and outside the classroom through service, leadership and extracurricular activities. All Rhetoric students serve for at least one year as an A.I.M. (Adopt, Integrate, Mentor) Leader with students in grades KP-5. Additional opportunities for service and leadership are given in the House System, Student Senate, Honor Council, National Honor Society (NHS), Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA) and student-led clubs. Our graduates are trained to be thoughtful people of action uniquely equipped to lead as servants, scholars, athletes and artists in their individual contexts. Geneva alumni regularly go on to successfully pursue degrees in fields ranging from engineering, research science and pre-med to business, humanities and the arts.

In addition to the Core Curriculum, students must earn credits in a foreign language, fine arts, athletics and electives. Students can focus on either Latin or Spanish for their language credits. Fine arts offerings include Band, Orchestra, Guitar, Vocal Music and Art. Athletes compete in cross country, football, volleyball, basketball, soccer, swimming, baseball, softball, golf, tennis, and track and field. Electives are offered in a range of areas: product-based (Magazine, Yearbook, Cinematography); competition-based (Debate, Speech, Jazz Band); academics (Computer Science, Lewis and Tolkien, Creative Writing, etc.). Geneva also offers 12 AP courses and a Dual Credit English program.

GENEVA SCHOOL OF BOERNE LOGIC SCHOOL

## OVERVIEW

The Logic School, serving students in sixth through eighth grade, teaches students to analyze statements critically and to argue claims systematically by arranging terms and facts into arguments. Students learn this art of argumentation to prepare themselves to always offer a reason, and to do so respectfully.

This dialectical approach to education can be seen throughout the curriculum (shown below). In the history, Bible and language arts classes, students read and analyze the structure of original, primary source material. In the Latin curriculum, students move from learning the grammar and the logical structure of a classical language to constructing it into their own language. In math and science, the students learn about the theoretical and the particular world from both an inductive and a deductive approach. These two different ways of thinking are studied in formal logic classes.
In the writing program, students learn the "before" (Pro) "exercises" (Gymnasium) of writing a classicallystructured essay. They practice the steps of moving from imitation to invention so that when senior thesis arrives each student will be fully equipped to argue and defend an original claim.

## LIFE IN LOGIC SCHOOL

Student life continues outside the core curriculum in fine arts and athletics. In fine arts, students are exposed to the harmony of music and the ordered form of the arts thus learning about God's order and harmony found in the cosmos. All students participate in athletics, whether it be P.E. twice a week or a variety of seasonal and competitive sports; competition happens in the Independent Schools Athletic League (ISAL) of San Antonio.
A liberal arts education is an education of the whole person that values the inculcation of virtue. So, in addition to curricular and co-curricular offerings, we also aim to build and preserve a culture rooted in the Word. This can be seen in our daily morning devotional times which are grounded in practiced faith and can be seen from isolated moments like Tolkien Day to the daily liturgies happening in the classroom. Our aim is to practice good habits that embrace, love, elevate and lead our students to become mature followers of Jesus Christ.

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## GENEVA SCHOOL OF BOERNE GRAMMAR SCHOOL

## OVERVIEW

The Grammar School, serving students in K-Prep through fifth grade, focuses on the study of the fundamental elements of each subject area in order to build a framework for future knowledge.
Phonics, basic math facts, problemsolving, chronological historical study, fundamental writing skills,


Jessica Gombert Grammar Headmaster increasing reading mastery and hands-on science exploration are emphasized as instruction capitalizes on the natural curiosity of the elementary student. Latin, the foundational language for the grammar and vocabulary of all Romance languages, is taught beginning in third grade.
Classical educational methodology is based upon the trivium (Latin for "three roads"), first articulated in the Middle Ages and carefully tailored to the predictable developmental stages of the student. Grammar is the first and foundational stage of the trivium.

## THE HEART OF GRAMMAR SCHOOL

We seek to instill a delight in learning with an abundance of knowledge and truth that will develop the minds, bodies and souls of our students. We encourage memorization and understanding of subject matter. Being able to read well is a major goal as well as maintaining an active reading life.
God's truth, beauty and goodness are interwoven throughout every aspect of Grammar School. We encourage the absence of screen technology for our students and seek to teach them how to learn and use their developing brains instead. Time is provided to contemplate and to foster a sense of wonder while utilizing the thinking routine of See, Think, Wonder.

In addition to the Core Curriculum in Grammar School, students are given many opportunities to learn and grow in these various ways:
P.E. - Each grade level visits twice a week.

Motor Lab - K-Prep through second grade visit the Motor Lab regularly to increase their fine and gross motor skills.
Art - Each grade level attends once a week.
Music - Each grade level attends twice a week.
Library - Each grade level visits once a week.
Docents - Each grade learns about the great artists and composers of Western Civilization from parent volunteers.
Field Trips - All grades learn outside the classroom by taking field trips. In fourth grade, students experience an overnight trip to Sea World and fifth graders travel to NASA.
