INCOMING 7th GRADE SUMMER READING ASSIGNMENT

Assignment:

For this assignment, students will select one book from the Summer Reading List to be read in its entirety over the summer break. Accompanying the reading of this book will be two short assignments that are designed to help the students 1) recall what they have read, 2) recognize meaningful themes and ideas with the book, and 3) articulate that meaningful theme to an audience. These assignments are due within the first two weeks of the Fall Semester.

Assignment I:

Students will write a one-page handwritten summary of the plot of their book. The summary should include:

- 1) Title and Author
- 2) Detailed summary of the plot of the book
- Identify a virtue or a theme that is prevalent in the work and makes the work meaningful
- 4) Explain why their peers should read this book.

Assignment II:

Students will give an oral presentation of their summer reading to their classmates. The presentation should be 3-5 minutes in length and will mimic the written summary. The written summary cannot be used during the oral presentation:

- 1) Title and Author
- 2) Detailed summary of the plot of the book
- 3) Identify a virtue or a theme that is prevalent in the work and makes the work meaningful
- 4) Explain why their peers should read this book.
